DAY AT THE RACES -- SUNDAY, DECEMBER 6, 1992

The San Diego Z-Club is sponsoring a day of racing at Malibu Grand Prix on Sunday, December 6. We hope you can join us for this exciting event which will start at about 12:00 Noon in the parking lot of Malibu at 8606 Miramar Road. Take either I-15 or I-805 North to the Miramar Road exit. From I-15 go West 1 mile and from I-805 go East 3 miles.

For those of you unfamiliar with Malibu, we will not be racing our Z's on the track. Midget type race cars will be provided. We will not directly be racing against each other. We will each drive one at a time against the clock. The goal is to clock the fastest lap. We may be having a contest to see who can drive the fastest four laps. There are three classes: Mini-Virage is for drivers 4'6" and taller, Virage is for drivers with a valid California (or other State) drivers license and Grand Virage is for Virage qualified drivers with a passenger 3'6" or taller. The cost will be \$13.50 for a Malibu Grand Prix license and four laps or \$19.95 for a license and six laps. No equipment other than you is required. #### TECH TALK

Tires are the single largest change you can make to improve the adhesion of your vehicle. When choosing tires, it is important to have the correct wheel width. A tire that is too wide for the wheel will belly in the middle, reducing adhesion and wearing out prematurely. Tires that are too wide can also make a car feel wallowy or unstable at high speed.

The ideal tire pressure is a function of tire size, construction, and vehicle weight. The lowest possible pressure that maintains stability, proper temperature, and proper wear is ideal. Initial starting pressures will be cold pressures, and should be equal at all four corners. Using different pressures front to rear should only be done after the balancing option on the chassis have been used up. After you have evaluated the chassis settings and still need to improve the balance of the car it is time to work with tire pressures. When changing tire pressures, it is important to change in at least 2 psi increments. If you wish to make a larger change to establish which direction to go, then a 5 psi change can be made.

Tire temperatures are among the best indicators of how a tire is working. If a tire is getting too hot, and the car is neutral in its handling, then you probably need a larger tire. If the tire is too cold, then it is not being worked hard enough, and you may need a smaller tire. Distribution of tire temperatures across the tread is an indicator of whether the alignment settings and the pressures are correct. The majority of performance tires work best between 180 and 200 degrees Fahrenheit. Temperatures should be taken as soon as possible and as close to a turn as is feasible. Time and long straights allow the temperatures to average out across the tread.

In addition to giving some indication of correct alignment and pressure, tire temperature can tell you about the balance of the car. Oversteer, understeer, and neutral steer refer to the handling balance of the car. Oversteer occurs when the front tires have better adhesion than the rear tires, and the rear end of the vehicle tends to swing towards the outside of the turn. Understeer occurs when the rear tires have the most traction, and the front end tends to "push" toward the outside of the turn, rather than responding to steering inputs toward the inside of the turn. The absence of either oversteer or understeer is referred to as neutral steer or neutral handling. Most vehicles exhibit a tendency towards understeer, while a few tend to oversteer. Generally, nose-heavy front engined/rear drive and front wheel drive vehicles tend to understeer. Rear and mid-engined cars tend to oversteer. A car that is displaying a strong characteristic towards oversteer or understeer will have a noticeable temperature differential between the front and rear tires. For example, if the car is oversteering, and the rear tires are too hot, then a reduction in rear roll stiffness would probably be the first adjustment to try. Since autocross does not generate the temperatures that road racing does, there is another tool which will help evaluate tire pressures and alignment. Using either chalk or white shoe polish, make two lines across the face of the tires and down each sidewall one inch. The lines should be 180 degrees apart. If the lines are worn off the center of the tire, then your tire pressures are too high. If the lines are completely gone, then the tire pressure is probably too low. If you can afford a tire pyrometer, it would probably be a good investment.

The monthly event for October was the "Re-Tire 1" road rallye, written and directed by Patrick Hubbard. Why the name "Re-Tire 1"? Patrick has reached the magical age we all aspire to; the day before the rallye was Pat's last day of gainful employment. He has passed the torch to the young upstairs and can now sit back and a) sip mint juleps by the pool in the shade of Eucalyptus trees; b) go fishing and be home in time to watch Opra; c) write more rallies; d) any damn thing he wants to; e) all, some or none of the above.

To celebrate his retirement (and continue to be a useful and productive member of society) Patrick created a rallye to match the talent and experience of most of our club members. #### **Z BOOK REVIEW**

Z Car - A legend in its own time by Ben Millspaugh review by Lance Wills

Ben Millspaugh likes Z-Cars. Ben likes Z-Cars a lot! Ben has owned several Z-Cars over the years and as of the writing of this book, shows a 280ZX that is convertiblized and modified with aero-panels. "Z Car - a legend in its own time" is Millspaugh's second book about Z's, the first being "Z Car Enthusiast's Guide." "Z Car - A legend ..." gives the reader something different than conventional Marquee devoted texts. Millspaugh starts with the usual history lesson (universal to almost all books devoted to a single marquee), but in chapter 2 he uses contributions from Z Car enthusiasts, primarily in England, to immortalize some very special Z's and the events that make them special. In chapter 3 he profiles Peter Brock and Lynn Godber and justifies their places of honor in the Z Car Hall of Fame. Chapter 4 is a collection of contributions (didn't I tell you this book was different) from Z Car Club presidents, Don's, Czars for life, etc. from all over the USA and world. These enthusiasts tell stories of Z Car Clubs that have built up massive memberships, fallen down, plodded along and resurrected, in any and all combinations! Reading this section will give us sympathy for Gary (our president) as he is frustrated in his attempts to clear the obstacles that face one who is crazy enough to try and keep a bunch of non conforming malcontents together. There are also lots of ideas that other clubs have done and perhaps we could also try.

Chapter 5 will interest the ZC/SD members who might be considering a full and complete concours level restoration of their beloved Z Car. It is the story of Mike Tollerico who spent two years of spare time and \$7664.19 restoring a 1973 240Z. The very detailed parts list covers 12 1/2 pages! Chapter 6 is for those who think our cars are clean enough to warm the hearts of cold-hearted concours judges. Ben shares some (not anymore!) secrets of cleaning places you didn't know your car had and how to make all the little thingies and

parts look real pretty.
