Evan brought a video of some recent ZCSD events. Included were some shots of the Autocross during the Convention, and last month's assault of Mount Palomar.


Gary motioned that we renew our membership with the Automotive Museum Car Council. The motion was unanimously approved.

The Vice President of the Z-Club of Germany visits the ZCSD

Rolf Doehring and his wife, Kris, were our guests at the October 4 meeting. Rolf is the Vice President of the Z-Club of Germany and owns a 1987 300ZX and a special model 280ZX. The 280 is one of 50 imported in 1982 that had a silver hood on a black body (similar to the black/gold of the 1980 10th Anniversary). The Doehring's live between Bonn and Cologn along the Rhine River. They were visiting the United States on vacation, as they had several times in the past. This time they were visiting the Southwest, one of their favorite sections of the US. They spent three weeks driving around California, Arizona, Nevada, New Mexico and Mexico. and a final week resting at a resort in Solana Beach. Rolf had sent a letter to Gary several months ago telling us of his upcoming visit and aid he hoped that he could meet some of the Z-Club people. He had learned of our Club and of our hosting the National Convention thru John Hunter Dailey, who writes a column for the Z-Club of England Magazine about what is happening with Z-Cars in the U.S. By coincidence, Rolf's visit was scheduled at the time of our monthly meeting, so we took advantage of the opportunity to have a guest speaker. Rolf, being a well traveled man, was able to tell us a lot about driving in other countries, especially Germany, and contrast with US driving conditions. For example; driving in L.A. during rush hour resembles normal traffic in Germany, rush hour gets a lot worse. There are no speed limits in Germany, except within town limits, but the towns are close, very dense and there is so much traffic that speed limits are unnecesary to limit speed. Taxes are about 50% of income. Gasoline is over \$4.00/ gallon. The Twin Turbo Z (available in 2+2 only) costs over \$60,000 and competes with the Porsche 911 and 928. The Z-Car has only been available in 2+2 form since 1974, when the body style was introduced. The European Continent has usually been about about two years behind the U.S. for new Z introductions, such as the 260 engine, the 280 fuel injected engine, the 280ZX.

Some of the things that impress the Dorhring's about the U.S. are the ease of travel (good roads, good signs), the relaxed driving style of Americans [yeah, that's what I said tool], the whole country speaks the same language. Language is still a problem in Europe, not just between countries, but between regeons such as the Rhine and Bavaria.

After a sufficient Q & A period Gary presented Rolf and Kris with ZCSD and Convention T-Shirts and Rolf passed around a few Bavarian Z-Club decals. It was truly educational and a lot of fun to meet and share experiences with people who live far away and speak a different language, but with whom we share a common interest and experience. Z Tech Tip of the Month



Is your ZX hard to start? Does it idle poorly or not at all? Are you getting poor gas milage? Your problem could be the result of a leaking air intake hose.

In order for a fuel injected Z car to perform to specifications, it is critical that the volume of intake air be measured by the air flow meter. Air that enters the intake system down stream of the air flow meter will cause a drastic reduction in performance and drivability.

The weak link in the Z/ZX air intake chain is the rubber hose between the air flow meter and the throttle chamber. Because the hose connects two components, one mounted on the inner fender and the other mounted on the engine, it is subject to cracking caused by almost constant movement. These cracks allow unmetered air to enter the intake system down stream of the air flow meter. The cracks almost always occur on the side of the hose closest to the engine or on the bottom of the hose so careful examination is required.

If you're into preventive maintainance, it's a good idea to replace the hoses on both sides of the air flow meter every 60 - 75 K miles.



KEEP THE BALL ROLLIN'

If you lived in California during the '60s, chances are you remember the Union 76 antenna balls. These little orange styrofoam spheres were promotional items given to customers who shopped at Union 76 stations. The balls were stuck on top of radio antennae everywhere, and they became somewhat of a fashion statement, especially among hot rodders and muscle cars owners of that era.

Well, the balls are back. Earlier this year, Unocal—the company that Union 76 evolved into—offered, for a limited time, remakes of the infamous 76 styrofoam antenna balls. The promotion ended March 31. In all, approximately one million balls were handed out this time around.

Does Unocal have the balls for another promotion? If not, you can bet that they'll make some more, because Unocal officials claimed an increase of five to 10 percent in sales during the promotion period, thanks—in large part—to those tiny little balls.

Of course, we here at American Rodder are looking forward to Unocal one day releasing a set of commemorative brass balls, to go along with their participation in the infamous clunker buy-out programs that we all know and love.

What's happening with Nissan in the News?

Autoweek Sept 12 softens on the criticism if the 240SX: "If you're not a Camaro/Mustang person, and the front-drive competitors leave you cold in a corner, you can't go wrong with this car. Of course, you'll pay more for the silky refinement, and you might suffer the taunts of Neanderthal macho jerks who have no idea what this car's really about."

Autoweek Sept 26 had a test of the 240SX; Suspension - loved it, Engine - hated it, overall - same as above.

The final race of the 1994 IMSA season was run at Pheonix International Raceway on Oct 1. Nissan 300ZX lookalikes from Cunningham Racing finished 1-2-3 & 6. Nissan was not going to let the second championship in as many years slip thru the fingers of their driving gloves. Nissan put four cars in the race; one for Steve Millen, one for Johnnie O'Connell, one for Butch Leitzinger [whom some of you will remember from the Convention] and one for Eric Van de Poele, a hired gun for the race. Eric and Butch's jobs were to keep the rest of the pack off of Millen and O'Connell's backs so they could score personal and team points. It worked. Butch finished sixth after being bumped off the track by Irv Hoerr who finished seventh. Van de Poele finished third running interference for Millen and O'Connell. O'Connell started on the pole, but was beat to the first corner by Millen, who led for almost the entire race with O'Connell second and Van de Poele third. So the parade went until five laps from the end when Millen, probably under team orders, but a team oriented act in any circumstances, allowed O'Connell to pass. What this did was allow O'Connell to get enoough points to finnish second in the driver's championship (second to Steve, that is). The series final standiings are: Steve Millen won the driver's championship, Johnnie O'Connell second, and Nissan very firmly winning the Manufacturer's championship for the second year (actually, Nissan had the title sown up in Portland). Nissan also captured the GTU championship with Jim Pace's fourth place finish in a Leitzinger (Bob, not Butch) prepared 240SX.
